Torbay Inter-Faith Forum 4 Youth aims to cross boundaries and thereby make new connections with people not normally encountered. In addition, TIFFY likes to introduce young people to new venues to broaden their horizons. TIFFY's visit to University College MARJON Plymouth accomplished both of these aims through meeting Plymouth young people and the Postgraduate Certificate of Education, Religious Education students as well as experiencing something of university life. The students organised the workshop of fun and informative activities, using their excellent creative and organisational skills to produce a valuable programme, enjoyed by everyone. The Academic Lead for the Faculty of Education, Teresa Griffiths, made the event possible and

The event appropriately came just after the United Nations' World Interfaith Harmony Week which focused on 'My friend of a different faith' and this TIFFY event was certainly in tune with that theme. The 29 young people and students and 8 supporting adults represented 6 faiths and a host of cultures

The young people commented on what had appealed to them about the workshop saying: 'It was a rewarding and worthwhile workshop.'

'Being at university 'l enjoyed meeting new people and the interesting because I don't normally meet topic appealed to with people of different cultures.' me '

'It was interesting and fun to engage with youth from different faith and cultural backgrounds.

'All of it appealed to me because it is good to socialise and it's good to

know what universities are like.

'I liked meeting new people because I made new friends.



The students divided the young people into teams and the day proceeded on a competitive basis, adding to the excitement and team spirit. It was said:

'Everyone co-operated well with one another and there was good communication and enthusiasm in group activities."





Communication skills were developed through listening, discussing and reporting back on group views.

'My communication skills have developed.'

'It helped me communicate 'I learnt a lot more with other people.' from the pupils.'

'I realised I need to listen to people to understand their point of view.'

'I learned how to work in a team, even if I didn't know my teammates well.'

'I am very glad I had the chance to put my views across.'



Focusing on team scores! The RE students were keen to discover how best to approach and incorporate young people of faith within RE lessons. This provoked a lively discussion and perceptive suggestions were made by pupils. The students discovered

Speaking in public was encouraged in the reporting back from group discussions. Pupils were very eloquent and clear in their presentations. Students had a scribe taking notes of the points made in order to encapsulate all the thoughts that had materialised.

Pupils were asked what qualities a good teacher required! Both pupils and students gained from this activity. Students learned what pupils expected from teachers and they discovered the pupils were 'astute in discerning a teacher's intentions.' One student said, 'I will remember the characteristics of a good teacher in my future teaching career'. Another promised 'to take time to really get to know pupils.' 'Hearing pupils' points of view was very helpful' for another student.

Pupils gained insight into the role of the RE teacher and one pupil summed this up by saying, 'I grasped the struggle of teachers!' Another wants to become a primary school teacher, 'so the skills for the good teacher activity were really helpful.'



The adults observed that the programme had been 'excellent', 'inspiring and 'encouraging' and 'an enriching experience for everyone'.

The students hope to produce a Guide for RE teachers to publicise the valuable insights which were gathered from 'Making Connections'.



The young people were delighted to be presented with 'goodie bags' to remind them of their visit to MARJON and there were prizes for the winning teams!

'I had to talk to new and different people and work with them, which is exciting and interesting – I learnt from them.
